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Policy Work

[Increasing Housing Affordability](#)

San Francisco is in the midst of a housing affordability crisis. While there is no one magic bullet to address this crisis, I've pursued various approaches since taking office, for example, legislation to restrict conversion of rent-controlled buildings to student dorms and my currently pending legislation to allow for addition of in-law units in the Castro.

One key aspect of our strategy needs to be creating more permanently affordable housing. I recently introduced legislation to incentivize developers of market-rate projects to include affordable units in their buildings, rather than paying a fee for construction of the units elsewhere. On-site affordable housing construction is the fastest way to create more affordable units. The legislation [encourages more on-site affordable units](#) by providing that if a developer chooses to designate at least 20% of units as affordable (i.e., more than the 12% legal minimum), those affordable units will not count against the unit density limits in place. That means that the developer can build a higher number of affordable units without requiring a reduction in the number of market-rate units. Purely affordable housing developments will also be relieved of unit density limits. The legislation, which won't change height or bulk limits, will allow for creation of more housing overall and particularly more affordable units.

We need to work to continue to increase our housing supply, not just for low-income residents, but also for [middle class people](#) who don't qualify for traditional affordable housing. Our housing crisis results partly from a byzantine project approval process, that often waters down or kills badly needed housing projects. I wrote an opinion piece in the Chronicle recently, which you can read [here](#).

[Sugary Beverage Tax Update and Rally](#)

Over the past year, we have been building an incredible coalition - and enormous momentum - toward a sugary beverage tax to fund nutrition, physical activity, and health programs. The measure will be key in helping us address the growing health epidemic caused by these drinks, including the rise in diabetes, obesity, and cardiovascular disease. I've been working closely with Supervisors Eric Mar, Malia Cohen, and John Avalos, and we've now crafted a measure that we will move forward together.

Transportation Updates

Transportation and Our Growing Population

With San Francisco's population projected to rise over a million in the coming decades, we need to remember that our conversations about transit are not just about fixing Muni's breakdowns today, but also about [improving and expanding service for tomorrow](#). If we think things are bad now, imagine another 200,000 people trying to use our buses and light-rail vehicles on a daily basis. It's critical that we prioritize funding for Muni, both through potential ballot measures like bonds and the vehicle license fee, and through making smart budget decisions here at City Hall.

Improving Pedestrian Safety and Award for Pedestrian Safety Legislation

The last few weeks have seen a number of tragic pedestrian deaths, bringing an end to another record, awful year on our dangerous streets. We need to continue to improve pedestrian safety by increasing traffic enforcement and through implementation of infrastructure improvements like sidewalk widening and corner bulb-outs. It's important that we not compromise the safety of people on our already-crowded streets, especially with our population growing over the coming decades. I was pleased to see the Chronicle [publish an op-ed](#) stressing that we all need to get serious about improving pedestrian safety.

I was also honored to [receive an award](#) from Streetsblog.org, for the second straight year, for my transportation-related work. The publication's "Best Legislation for Safer Streets" award went to my legislation amending the Fire Code to make it easier to implement pedestrian safety infrastructure improvements.

Road Work Hearing: Improving Coordination and Communication

On February 10 (date tentative), I will be holding a hearing on the huge amount of

road work currently occurring in San Francisco. Thanks to the voter-approved 2011 Streets Bond as well as other infrastructure funding sources, San Francisco is seeing unprecedented and long-overdue investment in our street and below-street infrastructure. The Public Utilities Commission is gradually replacing our aging sewer and water lines. PG&E is upgrading its natural gas lines to improve safety and reliability. And, the Department of Public Works is [greatly accelerating road resurfacing](#), more than doubling the number of street segments resurfaced last year and increasing our road condition score for the second year in a row. This infrastructure work is exciting, overdue, and critically important. However, in the short term the road work can be disruptive and cause frustration among residents and businesses. It's important that city agencies and PG&E coordinate their projects and communicate with neighbors about timing and reasons for projects. At times, projects can seem uncoordinated and unending, with numerous stops and starts and huge gaps in work.

Employee Shuttles

San Francisco employers have a long history of using shuttles to transport their workers, including public institutions like UCSF and private companies like Genentech. Recently, in light of the increase in employer shuttles transporting San Francisco residents to jobs on the Peninsula, there has been a lot of conversation about the shuttles and their relationship to gentrification in the city. On several occasions, protesters have blocked the buses and delayed workers from getting to their jobs. Yesterday, the Municipal Transportation Agency Board of Directors [approved a plan that will charge the shuttles for use of Muni stops](#), as well as rules to regulate the shuttles' use of the stops. I support the shuttles, which get cars off the road and allow residents to take buses to work in places where they can't realistically travel using public transit. I also support better oversight and coordination to minimize disruption of Muni and of our neighborhoods generally. I commend MTA for moving forward with this approach. I also think it's important to stop demonizing people for simply trying to get to work. San Franciscans have long lived in the city and commuted to the Peninsula for jobs in technology and other sectors. They used to drive cars, and now many of them use shuttles. This is a good thing. We are all frustrated by the explosion of housing prices, and we need to address that crisis. Blaming tech workers or employee shuttles isn't the right approach to improving our housing situation. These are fellow San Francisco residents - many of them long-term residents - and they deserve our respect and support.

Improving Our Public Realm

Hearing on AT&T Utility Boxes

There's been a lot of discussion in our neighborhoods about the installation of AT&T U-Verse boxes. In 2011, AT&T agreed to a number of stipulations as it moved forward with its state-law right to place utility boxes on our sidewalks, including to coordinate with neighbors if objections are received; not to place boxes in the face of significant community opposition; to implement streetscaping/greening improvements to compensate for boxes, where neighbors so desire; to hire local workers for the company's build-out; and to remove graffiti on the boxes within 48 hours of receiving notification. Last week, I convened a [follow-up hearing](#) at the Land Use and Economic Development Committee to hear from AT&T, city departments, and the public on how this process has played out. Through the input received at this hearing, and other outreach that I've done in the past months, I'm considering legislation to codify the rules governing these and other utility boxes and to improve the process by which these placements occur.

Greening Funds for Neighborhoods and Public Schools in District 8

In this year's city budget, I secured funds to support community greening efforts in District 8. The funds are intended to support sidewalk landscaping, tree planting, schoolyard greening, and other community-led civic improvements throughout the district. The City has partnered with Friends of the Urban Forest to help facilitate this exciting work. By early February, Friends of the Urban Forest and our office will send out a call for greening projects, ranging from a few hundred dollars up to approximately \$5,000. An independent panel will select projects for funding. Many of you have already expressed interest in these funds. Code Enforcement Hearing: Improving Neighborhood Safety with Better Enforcement

I recently called for a hearing to [assess the city's code enforcement efforts](#), including whether legislation is needed to improve enforcement as well as inter-departmental coordination. Pretty much every neighborhood has one or more blighted property that causes problems for residents. Some buildings started construction projects that abruptly ended without finishing. Some buildings are falling apart. Some buildings house people whose hoarding problem is so extreme that there is no ingress or egress to the building. Various city departments are charged with enforcing city codes in these and other situations, but enforcement is inconsistent. At times, neighbors complain for years, and even if notices of violation are issued, enforcement doesn't occur. We've also seen inconsistent coordination among departments. This hearing will allow us to see how departments are approaching enforcement, how they are coordinating, whether they have all the tools they need, and whether legislation is warranted to improve enforcement efforts.

Animal Care & Control: Profile in Marina Times of My Support for Agency

The Marina Times recently wrote an [article](#) on my work trying to address Animal Care & Control's lackluster budget situation. AC&C provides a safety net for all animals - including shelter services and protection for neglected and abused animals -and enforces against aggressive animals on our streets and in our parks. We need to ensure that this department has the resources it needs to take care of all animals in need.

National Park Service Dog Plan, Mayor Lee and Democratic Leader Pelosi

Late last year, the Board of Supervisors unanimously passed a resolution I authored putting the City and County of San Francisco on record in opposition to the National Park Service's proposal to significantly restrict dog access at the Golden Gate National Recreation Area (GGNRA). At a recent Board of Supervisors meeting, I asked Mayor Lee about the proposal, and I'm happy to report that the [Mayor joined the Board of Supervisors](#), and Congresswoman Jackie Speier in expressing the need to push the Park Service to better account for dog owners in their planning for areas such as Fort Funston, Ocean Beach and Crissy Field. Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi also recently requested - and the Park Service agreed - to extend the public comment period on the plan. To comment or learn more, click [here](#). We must balance the beauty and preservation of these open spaces with the needs of San Francisco residents and their dogs.

Historic Preservation: Mills Act Contracts

Since taking office, I've done a significant amount of work to promote historic preservation in San Francisco and to improve our approach to the subject. Our city is a unique and wonderful place, and our historic beauty is a key part of that uniqueness. We need to embrace our history while also acknowledging the need for smart change to meet our growing city's needs. In 2012, I authored legislation to improve our Planning Code's approach to historic districts and landmarks. In 2013, I authored legislation creating the Duboce Park Historic District and separate legislation to make it easier for owners of historic homes to access property tax credits under the state Mills Act. (Previously, the city's process made it nearly impossible for homeowners to access the tax credits.) Last month, I sponsored a number of Mills Act contracts - under which owners of historic homes agree to specific improvements to the homes in exchange for tax credits - mostly for homes in the Duboce Park Historic District. The Board of Supervisors approved these contracts, which is great news for historic preservation.

Community Updates

Safeway Recycling Center on Market Street to Close

The Safeway recycling center on Market Street [will close on July 1](#) pursuant to a settlement agreement reached between Safeway and the center. I support the closure, because this large industrial center has had significant impacts on surrounding neighborhoods. My office will continue to work with the Department of the Environment to explore other recycling practices, including a dispersed form of recycling redemption through reverse vending machines, so that we can ensure people have the opportunity to redeem recycling materials while lessening the impact on any single neighborhood.

Castro Streetscape Update

The highly anticipated Castro Streetscape Improvement Project, funded by money I secured from Prop B, continues to move forward on schedule. Led by the Department of Public Works in collaboration with the Planning Department and the PUC, the project will consist of sidewalk widening, new street trees, new street lights, repaving of the street, repaving

of Jane Warner Plaza, and installing new bike racks and leaning rails. DPW has completed construction documents and received bids for the project, and is in process of awarding the contract. Construction will begin as soon as February and end in October of this year. The phasing of the project scope is currently under discussion with the contractors with the goal of completing the project in the shortest time possible. There will be a moratorium on construction in the last two weeks of June to accommodate the Frameline Film Festival, Pink Saturday, and Pride events and the project aims to be completed by Castro Street Fair in 2014. Noe Courts Renovation

After four community meetings, the Noe Courts concept plan to renovate the bathrooms and develop a new master plan for the park is now under CEQA review by the Planning Department. After the CEQA determination has been made -- probably around the end of February-- Rec and Park will send out a public notice advising on the concept plan that is being recommended to the Rec and Park Commission for approval. This Commission meeting will either be in March or April.

Glen Canyon Update

The Glen Canyon Playground and Tennis Court project as funded by the 2008 Parks Bond is nearing completion. The Rec Center reopened for programming earlier this month. Please note that the Rec Center can be entered near the Bosworth Street entrance to the park. The tennis courts are in place and the play equipment is being installed. Additionally, the new restroom on the side of the Rec Center will open when the new playground does. In the next two weeks, you will see planting of the parks many new trees and shrubs begin. The park is planned to be reopened in mid to late February. My office, Rec and Park, the Glen Park Association and community members are planning an opening celebration for the Glen Park improvement for late February. Additionally, Rec and Park is continuing to work on the detailed design of the Recreation Center that will be funded by the 2012 Parks Bond. This design includes the following elements: the overall renovation of the existing building, two new additions which will provide three multi-purpose spaces/classrooms, a large teaching kitchen, new restrooms, new recreational amenities, a clear main entry and central welcome desk, and related landscaping surrounding the building. The public art element selection process is beginning and we will have options for the community to review and provide feedback on later this Spring. San Jose Avenue Update

Join me with the Municipal Transportation Agency, the College Hill Neighborhood Association and the Glen Park Association at an upcoming community meeting on Monday, February 3 to discuss proposed safety improvements for San Jose Avenue between Monterey Boulevard and Randall Street. The City, after many years of working with Caltrans and

other stakeholders, would like to present a proposal aimed at maximizing safety for all users of the street. Many vehicles travel well above the posted speed limit along this segment - this project aims to bring vehicle closer to 35 mph. Join your neighbors to hear more about this proposal and how the City plans on collecting data to evaluate the success of the project. The community meeting will be held at the Glen Park School (151 Lippard Ave. at Boswell St.) at 6:30pm.

24th Street Urban Village Streetscape Improvement

This project -- which is funded by money I helped secure from Prop B -- aims to create a safer pedestrian environment with better transit efficiency on 24th Street in the Noe Valley neighborhood. The improvements will focus on transit hubs in the main commercial corridor of the neighborhood through the construction of bulb-outs and high-visibility decorative crosswalks. The total project budget is currently \$560,000. A community meeting was held on October 30, 2013 at 7:00pm at the Sally Brunn/ Noe Valley Public Library. With 32 in attendance, the goal of the meeting was to determine, through community input, which street improvements to develop and where the money would be spent. The final community meeting will be on Thursday, January 23rd at St. Philip Parish, where the community would have the opportunity to comment and provide feedback on proposed streetscape designs.
