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[Repeal Mandatory Minimums.]

Resolution urging the United States Congress to repeal support HR 1978 in repealing Mandatory Minimum Federal sentencing guidelines.

WHEREAS, Mandatory Minimum Federal sentencing guidelines suffer from a lack of flexibility in sentencing, resulting in the imposition of unreasonable sentences; and,

WHEREAS, Chief Justice William Rehnquist has said that mandatory minimum sentencing statues are "perhaps a good example of the law of unintended consequences;" and,

WHEREAS, Mandatory minimums are not applied uniformly and have a disproportionate impact on non-white offenders; and,

WHEREAS, There is a growing body of research indicating that mandatory minimums are not achieving goals of reducing crime or drug availability; and,

WHEREAS, The expansion of the prison system as a result of longer sentences and incarceration for non-violent offenses has been at great public expense, \$3.4 billion in prison construction in 1997 alone; and,

WHEREAS, The cost of incarcerating one prisoner is over \$20,000, and over a million prisoners in the United States, more than half of all prisoners, are imprisoned for non-violent offenses;

WHEREAS, There are many people currently incarcerated as a result of existing mandatory minimum statues whose sentences should be revisited; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the United States Congress should repeal support HR 1978 in repealing Mandatory Minimum Sentencing, and grant relief to prisoners already sentenced under the guidelines; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall forward a copy of this resolution to San Francisco's Congressional delegation, Representatives Pelosi and Lantos and Senators Feinstein and Boxer, the Black Congressional Caucus, and Latino Congressional Caucus.
