[Declaring Transgender Day of Remembrance]

Resolution declaring November 20, 2002 as Transgender Day of Remembrance in San Francisco and expressing support for the expansion of transgender peoples' rights.

WHEREAS, Transgender Day of Remembrance is an annual event held in November to memorialize those who have been killed due to anti-transgender hatred or prejudice and has been recognized by the transgender community since 1998; and,

WHEREAS, On October 3rd 2002, seventeen year old Gwen Araujo of Newark, California was brutally murdered for living as a young woman; and,

WHEREAS, According to the Gender Education and Advocacy, Gwen Araujo represents the world's 25th death this year which resulted from violence against people who do not fit into traditional gender roles; and,

WHEREAS, Ms. Araujo should be remembered not for being a victim of hate, but for her beauty, liveliness, and her courage to live as herself; and,

WHEREAS, Despite the San Francisco Bay Area's reputation as one of the most tolerant places on Earth, this horrific murder underscores the existence of transphobic sentiments in our own community; and,

WHEREAS, For in her death, as in Matthew Shephard's death, as in Brandon Teena's death, as in Harvey Milk's death, she may have done more than she ever knew to further the cause of equality for those who are different; and,

WHEREAS, A day to specifically remember transgender murders will help raise public awareness of the shockingly high rate of violence against those who must live outside traditional norms of gender identity; and,

WHEREAS, The news media, while increasing coverage of hate crimes over the past decade, has seldom focused on the high incidence and intense brutality of violence against the transgender community which must live in fear in every locality and jurisdiction in this country; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby declares November 20, 2002 to be Transgender Remembrance Day and specifically memorializes Gwen Araujo for her remarkable courage to live true to herself; and, be it,

FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Board of Supervisors affirms its full support for the further expansion of transgendered peoples' rights in America and honors the efforts of trangendered people to secure protections from violence under the law.
