[Supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 2882 (McCarty) - Community Corrections Accountability Act]

Resolution supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 2882, the Community Corrections Accountability Act, authored by Assembly Member Kevin McCarty, which aims to enhance transparency, accountability, and stakeholder engagement in county public safety spending to reduce recidivism and improve outcomes for justice-involved individuals.

WHEREAS, California has significantly reduced its reliance on incarceration, with the combined jail and prison population decreasing by 41% since 2007; and

WHEREAS, In 2011, then-Governor Jerry Brown signed Assembly Bill 109, the Public Safety Realignment Act, into law, AB 109 shifted responsibility for lower-level felony convictions from California state prison and parole to county jail and probation, and tasked counties with reducing recidivism through evidence-based programs, including behavioral health treatment; and

WHEREAS, Counties have received State funds, including \$2 billion in Fiscal Year 2022-23, to support their efforts to manage certain categories of offenders previously held in the state prison system; and

WHEREAS, Counties determine how annual public safety realignment funds are spent through a stakeholder process that runs through a local advisory body in each county known as the Community Corrections Partnership (or CCP); and

WHEREAS, Since passage of AB 109, the behavioral health needs of California's jail population have sharply risen; and

WHEREAS, The share of California's jail population with behavioral health needs has increased from approximately 20% in 2010 to 53% in 2023; and

WHEREAS; As of October 2023, over 75% of people in jail in San Francisco have serious mental illness or a history of substance use; and

WHEREAS, Research has demonstrated that addressing the behavioral health needs of the justice-involved population reduces recidivism; and

WHEREAS, The State has undertaken major behavioral health reforms including the California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal (CalAIM) initiative enacted by the California Department of Health Care Services and Proposition 1, approved by voters on the March 2024 ballot, both of which direct behavioral health funding to the incarcerated population and make improvements to how behavioral health data is reported; and

WHEREAS, California county budgets have not yet adjusted to meet the needs of the current jail population, with 46 counties spending less than 15% of public safety realignment funding on behavioral health and 36 counties spending less than 10% of funding on behavioral health and 36 counties spending less than 10% of funding on

WHEREAS, On February 15, 2024, Assemblymember Kevin McCarty introduced Assembly Bill 2882 (AB 2882), which aims to improve transparency and accountability in county public safety spending, to ultimately reduce recidivism and improve the life outcomes of the justice-involved population; and

WHEREAS, AB 2882 would require counties to set goals for reductions in recidivism, daily jail population, jail bookings, length of stay, and increasing connections to behavioral health care services, as well as identify additional funding sources that can be leveraged with dollars allocated through the Public Safety Realignment Act to meet these goals; and

WHEREAS, AB 2882 would add to each county CCP a representative of a communitybased organization with experience in successfully providing behavioral health treatment services to persons who have been convicted of a criminal offense, and a representative of a

Medi-Cal managed care plan that provides the Enhanced Care Management benefit, a new statewide Medi-Cal benefit available to eligible members with complex needs; and

WHEREAS, AB 2882 would develop a public dashboard showcasing how counties spend their public safety dollars and outcomes for their incarcerated populations, including recidivism rates and outcomes, and aligns the Public Safety Realignment spending data with Proposition 1 county behavioral health spending data to compare county outcomes to the goal's set in the county's CCP plan; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors supports AB 2882, which aims to enhance transparency, accountability, and stakeholder engagement in county public safety spending to reduce recidivism and improve outcomes for justice-involved individuals; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco distribute this resolution to San Francisco's State Legislative Delegation and California Governor Gavin Newsom.
